

Limitations of a First Amendment Right

Although freedom of speech is a first amendment right, there are limitations. Here are some general rules for determining when free speech can be limited, which have been upheld by the Supreme Court.

Clear and Present Danger –The First Amendment does not protect the right to use speech that creates a dangerous situation.

Fighting Words – The First Amendment does not protect the right to use words in a face-to-face situation that are generally understood to incite violence.

Libel and Slander – The First Amendment does not protect the right to tell lies about someone or damage the reputation of someone through lies.

Obscenity – The First Amendment does not protect the right to use obscene language or distribute obscene materials.
